The HOYI Mission

The Hopi Opportunity Youth Initiative (HOYI) is a community wide collaboration of youth, parents, service providers, and community leaders engaged in research and development to improve the educational, career, and cultural attainment of all Hopi and Tewa youth and young adults.

Our target is to connect the youth whom are not actively engaged in school or in the workforce between the ages of 14-26. The goal of the Initiative is to **bring together** community members and organizations to build a common understanding about the needs of our youth in order to **promote positive change** and **explore opportunities** to help strengthen support for future generations living on and off the reservation. HOYI also strives to build a **safe** and **supportive** space for youth to share their stories, their insight, and voice as we **explore** new pathways and **expand** existing programs for their **success**.

Sustaining the HOYI Team



As a fully staffed team, HOYI has been very proactive! Despite no longer receiving funding from the Aspen Institute, the HOYI team along with our partner Marshall Masayesva and Andrew Lewis (consultant), traveled to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania for the Spring Convening. We were presented with valuable information around justice reform, the LGBTQ+

community and data equity. We are fortunate that the Aspen Institute has kept HOYI in the conversation and continues to be invited to these convening as a representative of a Native Rural community.

HOYI's Program Associate, Aeon Albert, and Youth Liaison, Lexie James, were invited to take part in the Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training, (ASIST). The ASIST was a two-day training where they explored the areas of intervening when a person is contemplating suicide. Although a heavy topics to address, the outcome is very rewarding and a great asset to have in the community. Next month our Youth Liaison, Lexie James, will be receiving training as a Safe Talk trainer. We are thankful for this opportunity and would like to thank our partner, the Hopi Behavioral Health Department for this opportunity!




Cultural Well-Being

New Developments for HOYI's Data Pathway

In the last newsletter, HOYI explained how we are embarking on a new journey to establish a data sharing culture between organizations that serve Hopi and Tewa youths. Supported by a small capacity building grant from the Aspen Institute's Opportunity Youth Fund, HOYI, in collaboration with its Partners, created a Data Action Plan that aims to support individual partner's data collection efforts. The collaboration, known as the Hopi Data Working Group (DWG), came up with 7 projects and initiatives that would benefit each organization to improve their data collection capabilities.

While most projects and initiatives will improve the internal process for the organizations, one project in particular is bringing excitement to the DWG: Youth Data Corps. This project will attempt to utilize the collaborative by pooling together the resources each organization has to offer so that Hopi & Tewa youths can exposed to the STEM/STEAM fields ("A" for art). We hope to work together to establish a calendar of STEM events to motivate youth interest into the fields of science, technology, engineering, mathematics, and art. Planning for this project will being this quarter and hopefully will come to fruition in the fall.

Financial Sustainability

HOYI continues to work hard toward a fundraising plan to sustain the work we are doing. We have currently phased out of our initial funder, Aspen Opportunity Youth Incentive Fund, as well as Partnerships with Native Americans, however, HOYI remains hopeful and motivated to continue it's grant seeking.

We participated in the annual AZ Gives Day 2019, that occurred April 2, 2019. AZ Gives Day is a state-wide online giving campaign that supports all Arizona non-profits. As a project of The Hopi Foundation, HOYI along with the other programs under The Hopi Foundation, helped to raise a total of \$26,740.56 with 27 donors specifically for HOYI. As an organization, we also won two prizes, one for "Gives Day Leaders Most Dollars for Rural," and we were pulled for a "Golden Ticket,".

Collaborative Efforts

The HOYI team was happy to be a part of the efforts to bring awareness to the issues around sexual abuse and we look forward to continued partnership with the HTWCEA.

Another great partnership was with Hopi Resource Enforcement Services. We joined them for their Annual Breakfast with a Cop event in an effort to bring the community together and get to know all the programs that serve the Hopi/Tewa community. The HOYI team hosted an informational booth with surveys for participants to fill out. This was a great event and HOYI is excited for next year's event.
